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

**Folks** . . . I recieved this email the other day and Laraine Stovall sent me this email-article. Not only do I like the article but want to tell you folks that this is all you have to do for an article . . . get busy . . .  $\bigcirc$   $\bigcirc$  !

#### Mike,

My husband and I have had a long-time interest in keeping and raising tropical fish. Even before my husband and I met I raised Killifish and then started to try my luck with the African substrate spawners. I lived in Texas then and these fish were not found very frequently there. Few folks in the 70's knew how to get them to spawn. From a trip to a Florida fish farm I brought back *Julidochromis ornatas*. The owner there said he could sex them well enough to get me a pair. I took his word for it and brought them back when I flew home.

I am not sure why I chose Texas Honeycomb limestone for their tank, but I do know I wanted something they could swim in and out of. I wanted the pair to be able to hide from their mate if they needed to. Soon I found they loved to swim and almost

climb in and around the holes in the limestone. In couple of months I noticed tiny little fish partially clinging to the rocks as they were looking for food. Quickly, I set up a Brine Shrimp hatchery and found the babies were quite capable of darting out to grab a shrimp or two and then return to the rock. Then another set of babies were seen, and then another until four or five spawns were all darting in and around the rocks. All the while the parents never tried to eat or disturb them in any way.

The larger offspring also, did not try to harm the tiny new ones! When it seemed that the tank was holding about 80 offspring I moved the parents to a newly prepared tank complete with more Texas Honeycomb rock.

The first time to do this taught me a new lesson. I found I could never move the mated pair in daylight. If I did they would fight after the move and one would be "treed" up the side of the tank, causing me to quickly put them back in the original tank. If I waited till evening though I could move the pair, turn out the lights and cover the tank so no light from the rest of the home would enter. By he next morning the pair was again showing their normal pair-bonding behaviors.

Skipping fast forward to the 2014's I decided to have a new tank with African substrate spawners. This time my first find was *Neolamprologous leleupi*. Thinking the same set up

would possibly work with I prepared a 90-gallon tank with Texas Honeycomb rock. It did! Soon the Lelupi had offspring. The five adults did not hurt the young newly hatched offspring even though in this case I could not be sure which two were the parents.

I added *Julidochromis marlieri* into the same tank. They have also spawned and now have three sizes of babies. All are

doing well together. However, the Lelupi spend most of their time on the right side of the tank and the Marlieri spend much of theirs on the left.

Sadly, I now need to part with them as my interests have diversified into another hobby. I must find a person who willappreciate them, their tank, and all the support equipment I have acquired. A person who will understand why I will suggest that they are to be moved with the container covered and when they are put back the tank should be darkened and lighted only the next morning. I am leaving my phone number if such a person reads this article.


Sometimes trying to figure out what is wrong with a fish is a little harder, you have to ask the right question. A friend of mine brought in her Betta, who was listless and laying on the bottom of the bowl. He was skinny and had very poor color. No obvious signs of disease. He appeared to have an appetite, but was too weak to eat.

First thing, I lowered the water level to just the top of the fish, so he didn't use all his energy just going to the top to breath. Since I was not sure what to treat the fish with, I decided not to add any medication until I did a little research. I put the Betta on live brine shrimp because it would swim to him and was a high-energy food. Within a couple of days he showed marked improvement, so I continued the live brine. Within a couple of weeks the Betta was swimming and beginning to fill out. I think he will make a full recovery.

I talked to my friend about her care of the Betta. She kept the water clean and fed a high quality flake food. She seemed to be doing everything right, until I asked how old was the flake food . . . more than a couple of months? Yes, maybe 6 months. There's the problem, the flake food has lost its nutrition. Each time the fish food

container is opened a little bit of vitamins are released into the air. After only one month the food has lost at least a half of the vitamins. After two months it is just about useless. It is better to buy a container of flake food that can be used in one month or put some in a smaller container and keep the larger container tightly sealed in a cool dry place. However, when the one Betta is the only fish you have then even the smallest container of fish food available may be several month's supply. Try sharing with a friend or better yet get another Betta.

Until next month, keep those fish happy and healthy.


